Monoprints from nature

A monoprint is a print which you make by adding ink to a surface and pressing paper onto the inked surface to create a picture. No two prints are ever the same. Here we will teach you how to use objects found in nature. We are demonstrating this print technique outdoors. Make sure it's not raining when you try this!

Repeat steps 1-6 until you are happy with the results!

YOU WILL NEED:

PAINT BRUSHES

PAPER

BRAYER ROLLER

PRINTING INK

INK TRAY

PET G PLASTIC SHEET

PENCIL

FOR VARIATIONS:

SCRIM

A CLEAN TEA TOWEL

WATER FOR WETTING PAPER

HOUSEHOLD ITEMS LIKE PACKAGING STEP 1



Squeeze a small amount of ink on your ink tray and roll it out until it is nice and even. It should look 'velvety'

STEP 3



Roll your ink across the plastic sheetuntil you have a smooth and even coating. Give it a good few coats.

STEP 2



Place your plastic sheet on a clean surface

STEP 4



Move the inky plastic to a clean surface and give your hands a wash. Place a piece of paper larger than the plastic really gently over the top. Keep it centred.

STEP 5



Using a pencil or the end of a paint brush copy a drawing onto the paper. Be really careful not to touch the paper where you don't want to make a mark.

When you are happy with your drawing, you can use your fingers to rub the paper gently to create shaded areas.



STEP 6



Peel the paper away from the plastic.



You can then take a clean piece of paper and place it gently on the plate to create a 'ghost print'. Here are some examples that Amy made using different images she created with this technique.





There are so many different ways to do monoprints you can ink an object, you can use scrim or netting to rub texture onto the surface, place string or bubble wrap onto the plate or paint a picture directly onto the plastic. Remember, every print will be a will be a mirror image







Drypoint Prints

Another name for this technique is intaglio. The idea is to scratch a drawing into card or plastic, apply ink, clean the ink so that it just stays in the areas you have scratched and then print. The print will always be in reverse, so if you are using words you can use your tracing paper and turn it over. Here are 3 videos we made to demonstrate this technique

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STEP 1



This could be a photo you have taken, a drawing, something in a magazine or you can draw from your head. You can also use words, but remember they will have to be a 'mirror image



You can use tracing paper to transfer the design onto the surface. Simply trace the picture and then turn your tracing paper over and press firmly on the lines



STEP 2



Cut the drypoint card into the shape you want with scissors

Use the scribe to draw into the shiney surface of the drypoint card. Use lines, dots, dashes, whatever you like. For larger surfaces to accept ink, cut away sections of the surface which will take the black ink and print by drawing around the shapes and lifting away the top layer, revealing the brown cardboard underneath.



STEP 3

Squeeze ink onto tray in a blob

Use piece of mountboard/ old credit card/ store card to scrape ink across the surface and into the grooves.



Use scrim to remove ink from the surface of the plate whilst pushing ink into the lines. Don't throw the scrim away after using, leave to dry and you can use it again and again.



Be careful not to remove too much ink.



Polish to remove a bit more ink using tissue paper, holding your fingers flat and rubbing lightly in circles.



STEP 4

Put pieces of paper in a tub of water to soak. This allows the paper to draw more ink out of the grooves. Leave for approximately 5 minutes



Remove paper from the water bath and blot with a clean tea towel to remove the excess water.

Paper should be damp but not dripping wet.



STEP 5

Place an old tea towel on a table. Put the inked dry point card on top with ink facing up. Place paper gently over the image taking take to centre it.



STEP 6



Put newsprint or scrap paper on top.
Use the back of a spoon to apply pressure. Press firmly but be careful not to move the payers. Hold the layers still using your other hand - if they move the image might be blurred.

STEP 7

Peel apart the paper and plate to reveal the print.







Collagraph Prints

A Collagraph print is basically a print made from a collage. It's a lovely simple technique and you can use items you find at home or out in nature.

YOU WILL NEED:

GREY CARD

PVA GLUE

SCISSORS

BUBBLE WRAP

BRUSHES

INK

INK TRAY

PAPER

TEXTURED MATERIALS: SCRIM, FOIL, STRING, HES-SIAN, CORROGATED CARD, **VEG NETTIN, BUBBLE WRAP**

USE A DRAWING OR PICTURE TO GUIDE YOU- TAKE YOUR SKETCHBOOK OUTSIDE AND **DRAW FROM NATURE IF YOU CAN GET OUTSIDE**

STEP 1

Cover your piece of grey card with PVA glue using the flat head paint brush.



STEP 2

Stick on various textures

and shapes using as much

glue as you need. You can use items you have around the house, such as string,

netting from fruit and veg

paper cut into shapes like

this flower Amy is making


STEP 3

Stick everything down firmly and then coat the whole surface with glue, taking care to brush gently into all the gaps.



STEP 4

Leave the sticky card to dry overnight.






STEP 5

Squeeze a small blob of ink into your ink tray and take a piece of flexible card or plastic and your brushes. It's a good idea to put your collage plate onsome newpaper or scrap paper as it can get messy!







STEP 6



Put your paper in the water for a couple of minutes and then blot it on a clean tea towel. It should be damp but not wet




STEP 7

Place your paper on a clean surface and gently place your collograph card, ink side down, onto the paper. Using a clean roller, gently but firmly press the back of the card for a few minutes, holding the card to stop it moving



Gently peel the paper away from the card and leave to dry flat. Take another peice of paper and repeat the process. You will get a fainter version.







You can re-ink and print as many times as you like. Enjoy playing!



Make sure you get ink on to all the surfaces, but work gently.
